STANDARD OPERATION PROCEDURE (SOP)

## THIS SOP is made on July 7<sup>th</sup> 2021

The Pangolin also locally known as the tengilling is a critically endangered mammal. It is a totally protected species and it is not allowed to be sold or caught / traded. The following are the basic SOP to be followed when a Pangolin rescue and release takes place.

- 1. Find out the details on how long the pangolin has been kept in captivity. If more than 2/3 days, the animal will be very hungry, dehydrated or weak potentially.
- 2. Always give some water if possible somehow to the pangolin without stressing it.
- 3. Wear gloves and face mask when handling pangolins.
- 4. Try to keep the pangolin in a large bucket or rice bag than a cage/sangkar. This is to avoid injuries which could be self-sustained by the pangolin
- 5. Always prioritize immediate release.
- 6. First thing when receiving a pangolin, check for injuries or disease. If any, bring to a vet for treatment.
- 7. If possible check the weight and sex of the animal
- 8. If possible, under the supervision of any expert, take some basic hair ,tick and one scale sample, which could be used for research later on.
- 9. Pangolin release should ALWAYS be in the evening, after 6.00pm
- 10. Ideal release sites are a) At/near tree hole b) Tree hole near a river.
- 11. Identify all the tree holes if possible near the Headquarters of the park
- 12. If Pangolin is kept overnight, make sure its in a bucket from which it cannot escape from or in a room where there is no escape passage. Toilet room or a room with no possible way of escape is the best.
- 13. Once released, everyone should keep a distance of a minimal 3 meters. To avoid stress in case it wants to open up and go out.
- 14. Wash and sanitize the equipment used and yourself after handling pangolins.
- 15. Put a camera trap at the release site if possible for a week.
